FILLING A NEED Rita Burdick Makes a Difference with a Bequest

When Rita Burdick's mother had a major stroke at the age of 97 in 1996, she didn't know who to turn to for care. She and her mother had lived together for all of Rita's life, so she was extremely hesitant to leave her mother's care to someone else. Rita's priest helped her find Regina Health Center (RHC), where her mother lived until her death at the age of 101. Rita would visit her mother at RHC seven days a week for the four years she was there.

"I became very attached to RHC after being there so much and seeing the wonderful care they gave my mother. I felt they did everything they could to make her life as pleasant as possible," said Rita. "RHC has been very dear to me."

Rita is so fond of the organization, she recently made a bequest to RHC by having her attorney add a few sentences to her will. She said the process was simple and it was an easy decision. "As the government pulls back funds and the cost of goods keeps increasing, I wanted to help RHC sustain its current level of quality care. Donations are essential to doing so," added Rita.

In addition to the bequest, Rita remains very involved with RHC. She has been the president of the Friends of Regina Health Center for the past six years and works with other members to hold regular activity programs for residents. She periodically serves as a Eucharistic minister for Sunday Masses at RHC. She also spends part of Christmas day visiting with residents and works to raise money for resident parties and other quality-of-life activities.

WEATHERING THE BUDGET STORM



As officials in Washington, D.C., and Columbus battle over budget cuts to reduce government spending, the health care industry faces much uncertainty. We do know for certain that significant Medicaid and Medicare budget cuts already under way will impact our operations and our vision for the future.

The two-year state budget, passed in July, translates into a 7 percent cut in Medicaid payments to Regina Health Center—or a \$210,000 annual reduction in income. Medicare payments to nursing homes will be cut by 11.1 percent

on average nationally beginning in November. For RHC, we expect this to mean an approximately \$85,000 reduction in income.

Our mission calls us to provide compassionate care to our residents in the winter of their lives. Our quality measures rival the best long-term care facilities in the county and we are already an efficient provider of services, so such steep cuts make it difficult to maintain the highest standards of care and quality of life. We are working now to assess what the exact impact will be, while carefully reviewing our budget for 2012 and seeking every possible way to control expenses.

Controlling expenses is only part of our plan. Our strategic planning committee is researching ways RHC can enhance its services to the community. To that end, we will be establishing a dedicated, self-contained shortterm rehabilitation unit to provide quality,

therapeutic services in a consumer-friendly fashion. While we continue to determine how to accomplish this expansion of services, we are actively building awareness of our quality short-term rehabilitation services. If you have a friend or relative in need of short-term rehabilitation, please contact us. We offer outstanding care in this area that we will continue to strengthen over time.

Medicaid and Medicare cuts are not new. Each time they occur, it becomes increasingly difficult to maintain current levels of direct care because staffing accounts for the major portion of our expenses.

In light of these most recent budget cuts, your support is more important than ever to help us maintain our mission of providing excellence in health care and supportive services to serve the needs of our residents. May God bless you abundantly for the support that you provide to our mission.



The Power of Bequests-Giving from the Heart

Bequests are instrumental in enabling Regina Health Center (RHC) to provide essential training for resident caregivers, including nurses, nursing assistants, pastoral ministry, dietary staff and the many others who provide exceptional care for RHC residents. Bequests have also helped balance the budget with additional funds when the financial markets have yielded low returns. Throughout the past five years, bequests have accounted for approximately 17.6 percent on average of total fundraising donations to RHC, which is more than the 2010 national average of 16.9 percent (based on a study by the Giving USA Foundation). "Regina Health Center's donors are extremely generous when it comes to including their favorite charities in their final legacy planning," said RHC Development Director Maureen O'Neill-Laszlo.

Types of Bequests

A bequest is the most traditional planned gift to provide significant help for worthwhile causes. With a gift through your will or living trust, you can retain full use of your gift property during your lifetime. There are a variety of types of bequests, which include:

General Bequest—the most familiar type of bequest, the general bequest specifies that the charities of your choice will receive a designated sum. For example, you might make a general bequest of \$25,000. You may prefer this arrangement because it is considered a primary charge against your estate, which means that your philanthropic intentions will almost certainly be fulfilled.

Percentage Bequest—an excellent alternative to the general bequest, it states that the charity will receive a certain predetermined percentage of your estate. By making a percentage bequest of 10 percent, for example, you ensure that inflation will not reduce the true value of the bequest you intended.

Specific Bequest—directs that one particular property be transferred to charity, such as a piece of real estate, stock from one company, a valuable art object or some other specific property. Please check with the charity first to ensure that your gift can be accepted.

Residuary Bequest—directs that the charity receives either everything remaining in your estate or a designated percentage of your estate after all necessary costs, all general bequests and all specific bequests are satisfied. It allows the flexibility of making several primary bequests while still giving you the assurance that the charity will be a secondary beneficiary of your estate.

Contingent Bequest—as the name implies, this bequest is contingent on some event. Usually, you might make a primary bequest for a spouse or relative, with the contingency that if that relative is not living at the time of your death, the bequest will pass to the charity.

Additional Ways to Create a Legacy of Caring

Our supporters often ask how they can support Regina Health Center in addition to our regular appeal mailings. There are several ways to make a deferred or planned gift—many that reap rewards for you now. RHC residents benefit from all types of philanthropy, whether a gift is made with outright cash or securities, or with a deferred gift, and you benefit by supporting an organization that means so much to you.

Savings Bonds

Although savings bonds have value, they may be subject to heavy federal income taxes, and state and federal estate taxes. By leaving savings bonds to charity through your will, they will be free of estate taxes.

Providing Assistance Outside Your Will

It is not difficult to add a charitable bequest to your will. A simple codicil, drafted by your attorney, will accomplish this. Listed below are other gift vehicles to consider without changing your will.

Life Insurance—you can name a charity as the beneficiary of your life insurance, you can transfer actual ownership of the policy to the charity or buy a new policy for its benefit. Your gift may entitle you to an income tax deduction.

Financial Accounts—most accounts at financial institutions can be made payable upon death to a person or a charitable organization.

Benefits from Retirement Plans—individuals who have IRAs, 401(k) plans or other retirement plans are often shocked to learn that as much as 60 percent of their accounts can be lost to state and federal estate taxes and income taxes at their deaths, leaving little remaining for heirs. If you make your favorite charity the beneficiary, 100 percent of all taxes would be avoided.

Living Trusts—many individuals have established living trusts or revocable living trusts. You can name a charity as one of the beneficiaries of your trust at death. If you wish, your gift to the charity can be deferred while lifetime income is paid to a family member. You can also provide for payments of trust income to the charity during your lifetime, providing you with a charitable deduction on your personal income tax return.

There are many ways you can support your favorite charities. For most philanthropic individuals, the greatest advantage is the personal satisfaction in assuring the future vitality of the charities that mean so much to them. Celebrating 160 Years of Commitment and Accomplishments

This year, the Sisters of Charity of St. Augustine (CSA) celebrate our history of 160 years, our memories and our services. Each ministry and person carries on the spirit (charism) of the Sisters of Charity. Together, we celebrate the lives of the sisters and co-ministers who have gone before us.



The spirit of the Sisters of Charity and our 160 years of accomplishments is abundantly evident at Regina Health Center. The need to expand long-term health care services for the aging religious in Northeast Ohio was first identified in a study conducted by the Diocese

of Cleveland. The Sisters of Charity responded by converting our Mount Augustine Mother House, located on 230 acres in Richfield, into a facility dedicated to serving the aging religious. More than \$7.5 million was raised to renovate and convert the facility for this important new use. Regina Health Center (RHC) opened in 1993 as the first collaborative health care facility of its kind in the United States.

Today, RHC meets the long-term health care needs of members of several Northeastern Ohio religious congregations, clergy from the Dioceses of Cleveland and Youngstown, and lay persons seeking a faith-based community environment. The most significant development in our health care ministries was the establishment of CSA Health and Human Services in 1982, a system created to strengthen each of the CSA-sponsored facilities.

Today, the system is known as the Sisters of Charity Health System and is nationally recognized for high quality care. It serves Cleveland and Canton, Ohio and Columbia, South Carolina through more than 20 organizations responding to community needs.

Underlying both the history and the service have been the physical hardships of the beginning, the material sacrifices of the growth and the spiritual struggles of the maturity of the Sisters of Charity. Yet, the call of God continues to find the response in the Sisters of Charity—who, out of the traditions of the past, find meaning for the present and hope for the future. COMMUNITY FRIENDS PITCH IN

Regina Health Center has always depended on a large pool of dedicated volunteers for help with numerous projects. This year, RHC also had the support of several groups of community friends who gave numerous hours brightening life at RHC. Below are a few highlights of the work our community friends have done:

Rev'd Up Retirees of Eaton Group—18 Eaton Corporation retirees come to RHC annually to help in several different ways, including working on gardens, performing outdoor cleanup projects, assisting residents around the building, helping in laundry services and housekeeping, and helping nurses with filing.

The Lubrizol Corporation—53 employees performed outdoor cleanup projects, including clearing an overgrown path leading to the outdoor Stations of the Cross, supplying and spreading mulch, supplying and planting flowers, and handing out cookies to residents. The group of 53 provided more than 400 combined hours of volunteer time. Knights of Columbus from the Immaculate Heart of Mary in Cuyahoga Falls—several members regularly volunteer their time at RHC. Among the many projects they perform, they are responsible for bringing Christmas to life at RHC each year by placing and decorating more than 20 Christmas trees throughout the building. They also come back to take all the decorations down after Christmas.

Key Bank—22 Key Bank employees, working through United Way's Day of Volunteering, chose RHC for their volunteer activities. They worked hard cleaning the gardens and planting, and assisting RHC office staff. ◆

Short-Term Rehab Restores Quality of Life

For older adults recovering from illness, injury or surgery, Regina Health Center (RHC) can help restore prior quality of life so patients can get home quickly and back to their daily lives. The RHC Rehabilitation Center features an interdisciplinary team of health-care professionals, effective rehabilitation equipment and private rooms for short-term inpatient rehabilitation. The center offers physical therapy, occupational therapy and speech/language therapy for both short-term inpatient rehabilitation and geriatric outpatient rehabilitation services.



In addition to exercise bikes, treadmills, weight machines and other rehabilitation equipment, the RHC Rehabilitation Center has areas for bathroom and kitchen rehabilitation.

Through years of experience providing comprehensive therapy to older adults, the center has proven, detailed care plans and protocols in place for many specialized treatments, including orthopedic, cardiac and pulmonary patients. "Our care is restorative care. We work with the patient and their family to develop and monitor an individualized plan of care that takes a holistic approach, caring for each patient's needs in mind, body and spirit," said Melanie Boge, marketing and sales representative, RHC Rehabilitation Center.

Our team is highly trained and devoted to healing and helping older adults return to previous levels of functioning as soon as possible. We have a very low 5 percent readmittance rate to the hospital, which compares to as high as 30 percent elsewhere. — *Melanie Boge*

Patients at the rehabilitation center have access to all the amenities offered at Regina Health Center, including daily Mass, resident activities, hair salon, library, ice cream parlor and RHC's serene environment with manicured grounds and outdoor gardens. Registered nurses are on duty around the clock, and psychiatric and psychological services are available.

Plans are in the works to continue to further strengthen the care offered by creating a dedicated, self-contained RHC short-term rehabilitation center. The vision for the expansion is to create more private rooms and a dedicated dining room for these patients. \bullet

Year-End Planning: Charitable IRA Extended to End of 2011

Good news regarding the Charitable IRA—it has been extended until December 31, 2011. The Charitable IRA allows donors aged 70½ to transfer Individual Retirement Account assets, up to \$100,000 per account holder, to a qualified charity (which includes Regina Health Center). Funds must be directly transferred to the charity to avoid income tax on gifted funds. It's also a way to preserve other tax-friendlier assets for your heirs.

Donors who take advantage of the IRA direct transfer opportunity will be recognized under Regina Health Center's Donor Recognition Program. Transfers of \$1,000-\$4,999 qualify for membership in the Circle of Abiding Love, and gifts of \$5,000 or more qualify for membership in the Circle of Abundant Joy for 2011.
